• It is also sad to note that in the draft regulations, the right to participate by both the general public and communities specifically affected, as well the days within which to participate or submit comments on the ESIA reports and or make presentations at public hearings have all been left to NEMA's discretion. This is retrogression from the 1998 regulations. It will undermine public participation, enforcement and compliance.

In view of the above summarized gaps in the 2019 draft ESIA regulations, we submit our full proposals and recommendations for your action, as attached.

Last but not least, we request you to work with us to organize a national dialogue on the content and implications of the 2019 draft regulations to it relates to dealing with existing and emerging environmental challenges. The dialogue will help stakeholders (government agencies, MPs, judiciary, CSOs, religious and cultural leaders, affected communities, etc) to appreciate the environmental challenges before-hand vis a vis the gaps in the legal framework to build consensus on the kind of legal reforms required to address the said challenges.
